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KILILI SELF HELP PROJECT sponsors training for farmers in Kenya and Uganda in the Grow Biointensive method — chemical-free, natural, sustainable practices that rebuild soil and produce two to six times more food than conventional farming.

Hunger, poverty, disease, and the human misery of these conditions can be eradicated by rebuilding soil on family farms so that intensively planted gardens can amply support a family's nutrition needs and provide extra food to sell.

In 2005, we trained more than 10,000 farmers in six-day workshops for less than \$6 per farmer.



Substantially more food in their gardens means self-reliance and food security for families, and extra crops to sell for much needed cash.

The full amount of all contributions goes directly to farmer-training programs.

KILILI SELF HELP PROJECT, Kenya and Uganda

PROGRAM: The foundation of this program is restored and maintained organic soil fertility. Farmers are trained in the GROW BIOINTENSIVE method, a chemical-free, nature-based, sustainable set of practices that builds fertile soil and produces two to six times more food than conventional farming using fewer resources.

RESULTS:

Hunger alleviation: Poor production on family farms due to exhausted soil is a widespread cause of hunger and malnutrition. Biointensive techniques have proven to increase food production from two to six times.

Soil restoration: Diminishing soil fertility is an acute problem in the region. By growing and composting plants with a high content of carbon and nitrogen, Biointensive farmers restore and maintain soil fertility.

Water conservation: Biointensive techniques significantly reduce the amount of water needed to nurture crops by building porous, microbe-rich soil which can absorb and retain moisture. This makes it possible to maintain adequate supplies of food even in drought conditions

Security: Improved and increased, reliable food supply stabilizes families and villages.

Nutrition and health: Organically grown, diverse crops improve family health due to improved nutrition and the elimination of toxic chemicals.

Poverty relief: Families benefit economically by the elimination of costly chemical fertilizer and pesticide inputs, and their highly productive gardens produce excess vegetables for market.

Education: Families with garden-based income can afford to send their children to school. Children are healthier and can learn more effectively.

Strengthened community: Training programs are community-based. Villagers come together for training workshops and subsequently to share experience and exchange ideas. The circle widens as neighbors see the results and are attracted to learn the Biointensive methods, and farmer to farmer training occurs.

Family-planning: Trainers emphasize the connection between farm size and family size. Nature-based farming methods make farmers aware of the "carrying capacity" of their small plots.

The "Grow Biointensive" approach taught in Kenya is based on scientific research and experimentation carried out for over three decades by John Jeavons and Ecology Action in Willits, California. Kilili Self Help Project is a project of Ecology Action, a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. In 2005, we were able to provide training for over 10,000 farmers, at a cost of under \$6 per farmer. These farmers will train their families and neighbors.

KILILI SELF HELP PROJECT in Kenya and Uganda, 2005

Kilili Self Help Project funds come mostly from kind-hearted individual givers. Many have helped the project since it began in 1989.

This year, several grants gave Kilili an extra boost. Grants from the Paul Newman Foundation provided for many programs listed below. Gifts from the Schaub Foundation, Carolyn Bostick, The Wine Library, The Mental Insight Foundation, and the Palo Alto Rotary made many more projects possible than ever before; and a continuation grant from American Jewish World Service has enabled us to continue a program begun in 2003 to support qualified women trainers in their work with rural farmers.

Biointensive is so obviously productive that trainers are inundated with requests, and almost always find more than the expected number of participants at trainings. Reports include comments like this:

Moses Tenai, trainer: "The farmers, being fully aware of the intense pressure on the land in their area, surged out for training in hope of realizing essential methods that can enable them to produce more food from sub-divided land, while improving the soil to continue producing for their children in future. As a result, 304 farmers turned out for training, 164 more than we were expecting."

Ambrose Yamo, farmer: "I never new that Sugarcane tops can give a good fortified compost, we just used to burn the materials after harvesting sugar cane. I used it in the short rains season to plant a one-acre farm and harvested 1350 kg of Maize where I used to harvest only 80kg of Maize. My family is now food secure and we can save our little income from vegetables."
